Lokita Jackson has lived in Boston for over 30 years and has called Hyde Park home since 2007. Over the years, Lokita and her husband assisted the former leader of the Rosebery-Ruskindale Road Neighborhood Association (RRRd) with steering the committee and ad-hoc tasks, and stepped up as an interim Co-chair to keep the momentum going when the leader retired. During this time, she contributed to the expansion of RRRd's city connections and reach as well as its collaboration across various neighborhoods and community projects. Lokita has also been an instrumental organizer and convener of the Crane Ledge Woods Coalition, campaigning to conserve local woodlands.

In response to calls for an advisory board that works to include the community in future neighborhood projects, Lokita took the initiative to organize what is now known as the Community Input Board of Hyde Park (CIB) in collaboration with Marcia Kimm Jackson and Marlon Solomon. CIB's key mission is to connect all Hyde Park stakeholders so all will have a seat at the table of decision-making for their beloved community. From the annual HP Idea Exchange to the new HP Youth Day of Play and the Cultural Hub Forum, Lokita is proud of the team of volunteers who expend their talents and passion to make Hyde Park even better than it already is.

Melsada Valarie Molyneaux is a woman of Faith, wife to her husband Roy and mother of two young men Jay and Mike. A native of the U.S. Virgin Islands, Valarie has made Boston her home for 47 years, 35 of which as a Hyde Park homeowner. She joined the East River Neighborhood Association and got involved to learn about her community.

In her professional career, she worked 14 years as a former Bank Loan Officer with New England Merchant NB. To be near her growing family, Val switched to the field of education, working as an elementary teacher, first at Parkside Christian Academy, then with the Town of Weston for a collective total 23 years.

In 2002, she was officially diagnosed as having Vitiligo, an autoimmune related disease and something she had never heard or seen before. After the Dermatologist stated NO cure and NO support Group, Val formed VITFriends (501c3) in 2009. This is a support group for people living with the skin condition. Today, Valarie stands as President and CEO of 13 affiliate volunteer led groups across the USA, this includes a children's and a teens group and supporting VITFriends Cuba. She started a PODCAST in 2010 & in 2019 with the addition of the North Carolina affiliate leader it has grown to a global reach with 12,400 listeners.

She works to bring people together, support students going to college, see teens collaborate with seniors citizens, educate children about Vitiligo, clean the streets of Hyde Park; That is Community, her Beloved Community!

Riverside Theatre Works (RTW) resides in the beautiful French's Opera House on Fairmount Avenue. RTW is a cultural mainstay in Hyde Park and the surrounding area. They offer quality productions, musical theater training and community outreach, bringing foot traffic to our local restaurants and businesses, and helping make the neighborhood of Hyde Park a desired destination.

She is proud to be the mother & grandmother of 6 Boston Police Officers, 1 Milton Police Officer and a Boston FireFighter. She feels that she's been able to pass part of Dr. King's influence in her life onto her children, grandchildren, great grandchildren and students at RTW.

As an antiracist, anti-bias, inclusive, multicultural educator and leader for 47-plus years, Marilynne constantly pushed against low expectations and structural racism, working in communities that supported the METCO program. Many know Gretchen in her current role as Executive Director of LGBTQ Senior Housing, the nonprofit partner in the development of The Pryde, Boston's first LGBTQ-welcoming affordable senior housing at the former Barton Rogers School.

Before embarking on this historic community-building work, Gretchen's distinguished career included serving as General Counsel to a state senator, staff attorney on the First Circuit Court of Appeals, special clerk to the U.S. Sentencing Commission, and as a pioneering civil rights attorney. She has served as President of the Women's Bar Association of MA, President of a Main Streets organization, and a trustee of her college. She has also lectured widely and taught at Suffolk Law School and the Harvard Extension School. Boston Magazine has recognized her as a Best of Boston attorney, a leader in Boston's LGBTQ community, and a Massachusetts Super Lawyer.

Her contributions in the Hyde Park community include serving on the Ward 18 Democratic Committee, helping organize and moderate candidate forums, providing advice and counsel to many neighborhood organizations, and working with Marcia Kimm to found the Racial Justice & Equity Forum.
